LTC Rich Wilson received his commission in the Field Artillery as a Second Lieutenant through the Reserve Officer Training Corps in May 2006.

After completing the Officer Basic Course at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he served with the 2nd Infantry Division at Camp Hovey, Korea and was assigned to 1st Battalion, 15th Field Artillery as a Fire Direction Officer and Platoon Leader. Following his tour in Korea he was assigned to the 4th Infantry Division in 2nd Battalion, 77th Field Artillery where he served as a Platoon Leader, Battalion Task Force Fire Support Officer and Assistant Brigade Combat Team Fire Support Officer. LTC Wilson attended the Field Artillery Captain's Career Course in 2011 and was subsequently assigned to 1st Battalion, 377th Field Artillery in the 17th Fires Brigade at Joint Base Lewis McChord in Washington where he served as a Battalion Fire Direction Officer, Assistant Battalion Operations Officer and commanded Charlie Battery (M777). Following battery command, LTC Wilson served as a Fire Support and Live Fire Observer Coach Trainer at the Joint Readiness Training Center. In 2016, LTC Wilson attended Command and General Staff College in Brunei. The following year he served as a Training Advisory Team Chief embedded with the 79th Heavy Rocket Regiment in Dubai, United Arab Emirates. Following this assignment, LTC Wilson was assigned to Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, where he served as the Brigade Fire Support Officer for 2nd Brigade, 25th Infantry Division. He then served as the Battalion Operations Officer for the 2nd Battalion, 11th Field Artillery, the Executive Officer for the 25th Infantry Division Artillery and Targeting Officer at the Special Operations Command, Pacific. LTC Wilson's most recent assignment has been as the lead Division Artillery and Field Artillery Brigade Trainer for Operations Group Bravo, Mission Command Training Program at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. LTC Wilson's operational experience includes deployments to Korea, Singapore, United Arab Emirates and Afghanistan.

In-Processing Ft. Sill

KEY NOTE

24-48 hours BEFORE showing up for in-processing; ALL new Soldiers MUST coordinate estimate time of arrival with their sponsor. Due to the training environment, if the coordination is not done, the sponsor may not be available for you to in-process building 4700.

- To make copies, come to 1-30th to make free copies. There are NO facilities to make multiple copies for free while in-processing Fort Sill.

PERMANENT PARTY SOLDIERS

- Upon arrival, all permanently assigned Soldiers report to the Welcome Center at BLDG 4700 (Hartell Hall), 4700 Mow-Way Road (Main East entrance under the awning). The Welcome Center reception desk is manned by military personnel and from 09:00 to 17:00, Monday Friday. The reception desk personnel then sign Soldiers in from leave, assist with billeting, and tell Soldiers when to return to inprocess.
- The contact number for the Welcome Center reception desk is 580-442-3217, DSN 639.
- Upon arrival at BLDG 4700, Soldiers must turn-in their IPPS-A Absent Request and permanent change of station PCS orders.
- A four day in-processing period is normal at Fort Sill. All newly permanently assigned military personnel receive briefings on programs, assistance, and services available on the installation, with attendance at some briefings mandatory. Upon completion of the central in-processing, Soldiers report to their gaining units.

STUDENTS

All Students:

- Reporting between the hours of 0800-1700hrs, on duty days, report to BLDG 757 "Townes Hall" to in-process the BN S-1.
- Reporting after duty hours and on non-duty days, report to BLDG 3410 "428th BDE Staff Duty" to sign-in. Ensure they give you a copy of your absent request after they sign you in.

Battalion History

Constituted 5 July 1918 in the National Army as Battery A, 30th Field Artillery, an element of the 10th Division. Organized 10 August 1918 at Camp Funston, Kansas. Demobilized 5 February 1919 at Camp Funston, Kansas. Reconstituted 24 March 1923 in the Regular Army as Battery A, 30th Field Artillery. Activated 4 June 1941 at Camp Roberts, California.

Reorganized and redesignated 18 May 1944 as Battery A, 521st Field Artillery Battalion. Redesignated 1 May 1945 as Battery A, 30th Field Artillery Battalion. Inactivated 9 February 1949 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Activated 22 February 1950 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

Reorganized and redesignated 25 June 1958 as Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 1st Howitzer Battalion, 30th Artillery (organic elements constituted 2 June 1958, and activated 25 June 1958). Redesignated 1 September 1963 as the 1st Battalion, 30th Artillery. Redesignated 1 September 1971 as the 1st Battalion, 30th Field Artillery. Provisionally reactivated on 16 December 1988. Staff and Faculty Battalion, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, re-designated under the U. S. Army Regimental System as 1st Battalion, 30th Field Artillery Regiment on 26 June 1995.

- 5 years and 4 months of time in country (Vietnam).

- First 155mm unit to engage the enemy in Vietnam.
- First Airmobile Artillery Battalion in Vietnam.
- Only 155mm unit to fire at the enemy in South Vietnam, North Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.
- Longest serving 155mm battalion in Vietnam.
- 15 Unit Awards.
- 13 Campaign Streamers.
- 2nd mostly highly decorated artillery battalion in the war.
- There was little surprise, then, when on 14 June 1996 the United States Army Center for Military History granted the distinctive designation "HARD CHARGERS" for official use by the battalion for all time as a testament to their tenacious efforts during Vietnam.
