Battalion History



The 1st Battalion, 31st Field Artillery was constituted 5 July 1918 in the National Army as the 31stField Artillery and assigned to the 11th Division. It was organized at Camp George G. Meade, Maryland 6 August 1918 but relieved thereafter from its assignment to the 11th Division on 30 September 1918. The unit demobilized 9 December 1918 at Camp George G. Meade, Maryland.

On 22 July 1929, the 31st FA was reconstituted in the Regular Army and assigned to the 2nd Division but was, once again, later relieved on 1 January 1930 from its assignment to the 2nd Division.

The Battalion was subsequently assigned to the 7th Division on 1 July 1940 and activated at Camp Ord, California where it was reorganized and re-designated as the 31st Field Artillery Battalion on 1 October 1940. It underwent another reorganization and re-designation on 1 July 1957 as the 31st Field Artillery, which was a parent regiment under the Combat Arms Regimental System.

The 31st FA was then withdrawn from the Combat Arms Regimental System 16 March 1989, reorganized under the United States Army Regimental System, and transferred to the United States Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC).

The unit was re-designated as the 31st Field Artillery Regiment on 1 October 2005 and began the reactivation process on 1 October 2010, attaining operational capacity under the 434th Field Artillery Brigade and activated on 11 January 2011.

Philippine Presidential Unit Citation



Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation

The 1st Battalion, 31st Field Artillery is credited with participating in multiple campaigns in World War II as well as the Korean War. It has been distinguished with several decorations, to include the Philippine Presidential Unit Citation and the Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation on three separate occasions.

These were awarded during numerous operations the unit participated in while it was under the 7th Infantry Division. In the Korean War, it participated in many conflicts including the UN Defensive and Offensive operations of the Korean War in 1950, as well as the 1951 UN Counteroffensive, the 2nd and 3rd winters of the Korean War.

The Unit also made its presence known during the amphibious assault on Leyte, in The Philippines, and many more amphibious strikes in the Island Hopping strategy used during WW2 to counter the Japanese hold on the Pacific.

Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) Mark "Adam" Jackson, a native of Palm Harbor, FL, received his commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Central Florida in 2002, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in History. LTC Jackson's previous assignments include: Tank and Scout Platoon Leader, and Troop Executive Officer of A Troop, 1-1CAV, at Armstrong Barracks, Germany; Squadron Logistics Officer and Plans Officer of 6-4 CAV, 3IBCT/1ID, at Fort Hood, Texas; Cavalry Troop Commander, C Troop, 1/3ACR, and Headquarters Troop Commander, 4/3CR, at Fort Hood, Texas; Plans Officer, Headquarters, 25ID, Battalion Operations Officer, 2-35IN, 3IBCT/25ID, Squadron Executive Officer, 3-4CAV, 3IBCT/25ID, and Brigade Executive Officer, 3IBCT/25ID, at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii; S3 Trainer, Light Task Force (Airborne) Trainers, and Chief of Plans and Operations, Headquarters, Operations Group, NTC, at Fort Irwin, California; and, most recently, as an Instructor in the Department of Distance Education, Command and General Staff College, at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

LTC Jackson's military education includes the Armor Officer Basic Course, the Maneuver Captain's Career Course, the Cavalry Leaders Course, the Command and General Staff Officer Course, and the School of Advanced Military Studies. His civilian education also includes a Master of Science degree in Adult, Occupational, and Continuing Education from Kansas State University and a Master of Military Art and Science degree in Operational Art and Science from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College

LTC Jackson's awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal (1 OLC), Meritorious Service Medal (3 OLC), Army Commendation Medal (4 OLC), Army Achievement Medal (2 OLC), National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal (1 CS), Iraq Campaign Medal (4 CS), Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon, Overseas Service Ribbon (Numeral 4), North-Atlantic Treaty Organization Medal, Basic Parachutist Badge, Pathfinder Badge, and Combat Action Badge.

In-Processing Ft. Sill



KEY NOTE

24-48 hours BEFORE showing up for in-processing, ALL new Soldiers MUST have their sponsor present. Due to the training environment, the sponsor may not be available if no coordination occurs PRIOR to checking into building 4700.

To make copies, come to 1-31 to make free copies. There are NO facilities to make multiple copies for free while in-processing Fort Sill.

PERMANENT PARTY SOLDIERS

Upon arrival, all permanently assigned Soldiers report to the Welcome Center at building 4700 (Hartell Hall), 4700 Mow-Way Road (Main East entrance under the awning). The Welcome Center reception desk is manned by military personnel and open 24 hours daily. The reception desk personnel then sign Soldiers in from leave, assist with billeting, and tell Soldiers when to return to inprocess.

The contact number for the Welcome Center reception desk is 580-442-3217, DSN 639.

Upon arrival at Building 4700, Soldiers must turn-in their DA Form 31 and permanent change of station (PCS) orders

A 2-day in-processing period is normal at Fort Sill. All new permanently assigned military personnel receive briefings on programs, assistance, and services available on the installation, with attendance at some briefings mandatory. Upon completion of the central in-processing, Soldiers report to their gaining units.

In-Processing Out-Processing Chapter Separations

Privately Owned Weapons (POW): Soldiers reporting to Fort Sill due to a permanent change of station (PCS), MUST register any privately owned weapons with the Police Administrative Branch, room 218, building 4700. You must clear through the Police Administrative Branch and request cancellation of firearms registration as part of out-processing.

Reporting In (24 Hour Operation): Upon arrival, permanently assigned Soldiers report to the Welcome Transient Operations, in the Soldier and Family Support Center, Building 4700 (Hartell Hall), Mow-Way Road (use east entrance under the awning). Upon entering, report to the front desk. Point of contact is the Transient Reception Liaison NCO (580) 442-3217. For driving instruction to this building click "HERE." Map

Normal Hours of Operation: 0830-1630 Monday through Friday, closed Saturdays, Sundays, and Federal holidays. Points of contact are: Branch Chief (580) 442-3007, Supervisor (580) 442-5122 and Team Leader (580) 442-4579. For driving instructions to this building click "HERE". Map

Required Documents: Upon arrival at Building 4700, Soldiers must turn-in the following items:

- DA Form 31
- · Permanent Change of Station (PCS) Orders

Permissive TDY (House Hunting): Permissive TDY (house hunting) must be approved by the losing command prior to arrival at Fort Sill. For those with pre-approved permissive TDY, report to the Housing Services Office, Building 4700, 3rd Floor to have your DA Form 31 stamped with the date of arrival to begin your 10 day house hunting. Soldiers without pre-approved permissive TDY from their losing command must complete inprocessing to their gaining unit at Fort Sill and then request permissive TDY through their new commander.






